I've become fascinated with *Blue Zones*, a term coined by author and former National Geographic researcher, Dan Buettner. These zones are areas around the world where citizens live exceptionally long lives due to their diet, physical activity, social interaction, sense of purpose, faith, and more. These places are found in California, Costa Rica, Italy, Greece, and Japan. One of the most eye-opening aspects of these people is that they all garden.

BlueZones.com contributor writer, Lincoln Williams says, "In all blue zones, people continue to garden even into their 90s and 100s. Gardening is the epitome of a blue zones activity because it's sort of a nudge: You plant the seeds and you're going to be nudged in the next three to four months to water it, weed it, harvest it. And when you're done, you're going to eat an organic vegetable, which you presumably like because you planted it. Gardening offers an array of benefits for people whose activities are limited. It's a good form of exercise that's not overly strenuous, a way for people to remain active, and offers an opportunity to socialize. Gardening also has the

benefits of fresh air and sunshine—all that vitamin D is good for you." Now with that bit of information, I can imagine that you've decided to consider a lifetime membership to the Garden Club!

Spotlight on Members

All of our members have wonderful and personal stories to share about their life and love of gardening. We thank Louise Guszick for sharing hers with us.

Louise has been a resident of Northeastern Pennsylvania for almost 50 years. She moved here to explore new opportunities.

Louise was born and raised in Paterson, New Jersey. She graduated from William Paterson University in 1971 with a Bachelor's Degree in Nursing and completed a Master's of Science in Nursing in 1980, which included a certification as a Family Nurse Practitioner. She worked locally in New Jersey.

Upon moving to Pennsylvania in 1975
Louise worked at Marian Community
Hospital (formerly St. Joseph's),
Carbondale, PA; Misericordia University,
Dallas, PA; and the Department of Veterans
Affair, Wilkes-Barre, PA. She spent 32
years at the VA in Primary Care and
Women's Health and established a
nationally recognized Diabetes Education
Program during her tenure.

In 1979 Louise was commissioned as a Captain in the Army Reserve Nurse Corps. From 1990-1991 she was deployed to Saudi Arabia for Operation Desert Storm. Her overseas assignments included Wurstburg, Germany; Panama; Honduras and Guatemala. In 2006 Louise was again called to active duty in support of Operation

Enduring Freedom, Hattiesburg, Mississippi. She completed 30 years of service in 2009 having attained the rank of Colonel.

After retirement in 2011 Louise decided to pursue her love of gardening and completed a course with Pennsylvania State University Master Gardener Program. She joined the Mountain View Garden Club around 2013.

Louise currently resides in Clifford Township with her husband, Steve. They have 2 children, Stephen and Michael, and 3 grandchildren. In addition to gardening she enjoys exercise, reading, and cooking.

All about Honey Bees

Presented by Orna Clum September 17, 2024

Bees perceive colors differently than we do!



Some of the equipment used in beekeeping. Bees only sting when they are guarding the colony or if they feel threatened.



A variety of honey from our region and from around the world that we were able to sample.

- Spring honey is lighter in color, while dark honey is produced in the fall.
- Nectar from flowers is what attracts bees.
- Bees pollinate 70% of our food crops.
- Propolis is "bee glue" used to build and maintain the hive.
- The mite, Varroa Destructor, and the hive beetle are pests that threaten bee colonies.

Presentation by Educational Grant Recipients

October 15, 2024

The Educational Grant Program is a new addition to the Mountain View Garden Club's outreach to the community. The grants are available to teachers from schools in the surrounding areas for projects and field trips that reflect our mission. Teacher Kristina Fitzsimmons, from Forest City Regional, used her grant money to take kindergarten students to Clifford Park. In class the students studied the forest eco system and were able to identify aspects of their lessons at the park. Eighth grade students, two of whom accompanied Ms. Fitzsimmons to our meeting, were also part of the project and acted as guides for the field trip. In all, fifty-five students participated in the project.



Alexandra Higgens used her grant money to take her hydroponic class to the Botanic Gardens at Penn State University. The thirty-three Carbondale High School students were given a guided tour of the gardens. They were also able to explore various gardens on their own. The students later wrote a reflection paper on their experience.



A sensory garden was the goal of Sheri Ransom from Mountain View School. She used her grant money to purchase supplies for the garden located in the elementary school courtyard. Students from Ms. Ransom's emotional support group worked on the project during the summer months.
